### KEEP & CREE

We need our vehicles for work and recreation - maintaining them is important. It's also important to maintain our waterways by preventing automotive fluids and chemicals from polluting them!





Regularly inspect your vehicle and home driveway or parking space for any signs of an oil or fluid leak. If a leak spill is found, apply sawdust or cat litter over the spill to absorb the fluid and then sweep up the material. NEVER hose leaked fluid out into the street!

Use a professional oil change or mechanic shop for auto maintenance whenever possible. If changing motor oil or working on an engine at home, drain any used oil or auto fluids into a reuseable, sealable container and properly dispose of it at the City of San Antonio's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Drop-Off Center or at a local recycling center.



When washing your vehicle at home, park it on your front lawn or grassy property instead of on your driveway - grass can help catch soapy runoff before it flows down the street and into storm drains. Use a paid car wash facility whenever possible - these have special ground drains installed which capture and recycle water runoff.

Seal and store any unused motor oil, automotive fluids and cleaning products in dry, safe household areas according to manufacturer directions.



DON'T GET FINED: Illicit dumping or spilling of motor oil and other household hazardous waste chemical products in streets, storm drains, drainage ditches and other City-owned rights-of-way is against the law (San Antonio City Ordinances (Section 34-702, Prohibited discharges into the MS4, and Section 34-704, Placing household hazardous wastes into the MS4).

Our lawns require lots of care and maintenance to look their best. Our rivers and creeks require the same to remain clean and safe for all.









#### **At The Store**

- · Purchase lawn fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides only in the amounts you need so that they're used up faster and require less storage.
- Consider purchasing products that are labeled "non-toxic", "organic" or "earth friendly"



#### **On Your Lawn**



- Apply fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides according to excess amounts can get washed into the streets and down the storm drains when it rains.
- Always check the weather forecast before using lawn products - if rainfall is predicted, wait to use them 2-3 days after wet weather has passed.

#### Yard Trimming/ Leaf Blowing/Landscaping

- · When trimming your lawn or pruning your trees and plants, be sure to properly bag and dispose of all loose clippings. Avoid blowing, sweeping or hosing into the street where they can enter storm drains.
- REMEMBER: illicit dumping of grass/leaf clippings into streets is against the law (San Antonio City Ordinance Section 34-703, Placing brush cuttings, clippings and/or rubbish into the MS4). Don't get fined!
- When landscaping always cover up piles of dirt, soil, and mulch with a tarp or other durable material to prevent rain or wind from sending it into streets and down storm drains.

### **Keep Your Cool: Trustworthy AC Repair Tips**

Slowly but surely, that famous Texas heat is returning and will be back in triple digits. It's important to be prepared in case you begin experiencing problems with your air conditioning unit or just need a preventative maintenance check.

According to <u>energy.gov</u>, furnaces and air conditioners need their filters cleaned and changed every couple of months. A dirty filter can also increase energy costs and damage equipment. Maintaining your home's heating and cooling systems can improve the overall air quality of your home, cut energy costs and help alleviate allergies.

If your AC needs a bit of work or isn't cooling properly, annual spring maintenance can help improve efficiency and prolong the life of your unit. In 2019, Better Business Bureau (BBB) received 2,800+ complaints regarding HVAC contractors nationwide. These complaints can range up to \$1,500 in financial loss and common issues deal with billing, the quality of workmanship or lack of proper permits.

As a homeowner, you should also always be on the lookout for red flags of unreliable businesses. BBB warns against these signs for untrustworthy AC Contractors or any other home improvement services:

- **Start with research.** Visit <u>bbb.org</u> to see a business's profile and check their complaint history and customer reviews. BBB Request-A-Quote is a tool allowing you to get fast quotes from accredited businesses. Ask for referrals from trusted people.
- Verify licenses. Often, low rated businesses in this industry don't have the proper licenses to do repair or installation work. Verify with Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR.texas.gov/LicenseSearch) that they have updated licenses matching the business name.
- Avoid high pressure tactics. Typically, they might try this by offering you a great deal and saying its only good right then. In most cases, if a deal is good one day, it will be good the next. Be especially careful with door-to-door solicitors who might not be working with legitimate businesses.
- Get everything in writing. Another common complaint is warranty issues. Getting everything in writing can help your case if you find yourself in this situation. Get up to 3 estimates and make payment using reliable methods such as check or credit card.
- Asks for a large upfront payment. A typical payment schedule should follow the "Rule of Thirds." The first payment is given when signing the contract and helps pay for materials, the second payment when work begins, and the final payment when the job is finished, and you are satisfied with the quality of work.
- To find a trustworthy AC Repair company, file a complaint or leave a positive review, visit <u>bbb.org</u>.

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




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
