



## Kids at Play

Summer is fast approaching, and for many of our youngest residents that means they have the freedom to play outside to their heart's content (or at least until mom or dad call them back inside). While we encourage kids to enjoy summer to the fullest, we also want everyone to stay safe. Here are a few guidelines to make sure these school-free months go smoothly:

- Make sure your children are proactive about their safety. Whether they're playing at a park, swimming at a pool or riding their bikes around the neighborhood, it's important that kids understand what types of injuries could occur during these activities and how they can best avoid them. If an injury does occur, your kids need to know what actions to take—such as alerting a trusted adult or, in the case of a true emergency, calling 911.
- Supervise your kids at the pool. While it's always a good idea to keep an eye on your kids, it's particularly important to make sure your children have adult supervision while they're in the water. It only takes a second for even good swimmers to

find themselves in a dangerous situation, so it's vital that kids are supervised by someone who knows the signs of a distressed swimmer. To learn about how you can keep your family safe at the pool, visit www.poolsafety.gov.

- Slow down while driving through the neighborhood. All residents should take note of this rule. With children out and about in full-force during the summer, you're more likely than ever to see a distracted kid chasing after a run-away baseball or skateboarding on the streets. So slow down, be extra aware of what's going on around you, and be prepared to stop suddenly if a child runs out into the road. Parents should remind kids that they have a responsibility to be aware of oncoming cars as well, and to be extra careful when they are on the street.
- Remind older kids to check in with you when they're playing without adult supervision. When kids are out on their own, it's easy for them to forget to let their parents know they're okay. So establish a set of rules, such as checking in every few hours or whenever they change locations, and be firm about enforcing them. If your child has a hard time remembering to give you a call every so often, it might be helpful to have them set an alarm on their cell phone or watch so they don't forget. It's a great way for kids to build a sense of independence and for you to know they're safe even when they're not within sight.

# Waste-Free Yards Keeps Pets Healthy

American pet owners collectively spend tens of millions of dollars every year on veterinary care and over-the-counter medicines for their furry loved ones. But what many don't realize is that many pet illnesses can be avoided by simply keeping the back yard clear of pet waste.

Dog waste is more than just a smelly and unsightly mess. It's also a breeding ground for infection—especially in dog parks and other areas where dogs frequently gather. Bacteria, worms and other parasites thrive in the waste until it's cleaned up or washed into the water supply. Giardia, ringworm, roundworm and E. coli are examples of such inhabitants, all of which are commonly found in dog feces and are easily transferable upon contact.

When pets become sick, contagions are often times passed through their deposits into their own yard. The longer infected dog waste stays on the ground, the greater a contamination becomes. And when this waste is not picked up, pets have a high risk of catching the infection over and over again.

Roundworm, for example, is one of the most common parasites found in dog waste and it can remain infectious in contaminated soil and water for years.

The best thing pet owners can do to help keep their four-legged friends healthy and safe is to pick up after them and to do so in a timely manner. Those who don't have enough time to deal with the mess themselves—or simply don't want to—should consider hiring a local pet waste removal service.



## RESIDENTIAL LIGHTING FOR STREETS

## **FACT SHEET**

The San Antonio City Council created a streetlight initiative in FY 2022 to identify gaps in lighting for residential streets within city limits, following the regulations of the Unified Development Code (UDC).

## THE STUDY (GAP ANALYSIS)

In coordination with CPS Energy, all residential streets (3,292 miles) within the city limits were analyzed. Residential streets are defined as those having houses facing them and contained within a neighborhood.

The study focused on looking at existing light locations (provided by CPS Energy) and identifying "gaps," or missing lights along residential streets. This analysis was based on the UDC requirements for spacing (300 ft. minimum and 600 ft. maximum).

## WHERE STREET LIGHTS CAN BE INSTALLED

Illumination on residential streets and properties is important to traffic and pedestrian safety, quality of life, and well being of our community. Following the requirements of the UDC, streetlights are placed in all:

- new subdivisions
- · street intersections
- cul-de-sacs longer than 200 ft.
- along streets (midblock between intersections) where:
  - gap between existing streetlights is greater than 600 ft.
  - o there is a significant curvature in the street

New streetlights can be installed on existing poles or may require a new one. In instances where new poles are needed, an easement by applicable property owners may also be required. Installation of the light can only be done with the approval of the easement.

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It's not just about cleaning, it's about disinfecting your home.

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Please be advised the City of San Antonio does not install streetlights in the following locations:

- alleys
- drainage channels
- greenbelts
- TxDOT right of way
- outside city limits

## INSTALLATION PHASES FOR NEW LIGHTING

There are two phases for installation:

- Phase 1 installation of new street lights on existing poles (1 to 3 months)
- Phase 2 tiered installation for new lights and new poles. This
  step requires easements from applicable property owners (6 to
  12 months, once needed easements are obtained). Priorities are
  schools, crime areas, Vision Zero, and VIA bus routes.

## WHAT IS THE INSTALLATION PROCESS?

Homeowners (identified in Bexar County Appraisal District) surrounding proposed light locations will be notified by mail their lot has been identified as a potential location for a street light.

CPS Energy is our partner in this effort and will:

- reach out and work with homeowners for approval of use of easement
- design the street light (overhead and underground)
- · release design to their construction team
  - will schedule and install proposed light
- notify City of completed installation
- notify City of locations where installation was not possible or easements could not be obtained

## WHAT ABOUT SECURITY LIGHTING?

As a residential property owner, you can request up to six all night security lights (ANSL) for your home. For more information or to request an ANSL:

Please note, the cost for the security light(s) is added to the property owner's utility bill and varies depending on the wattage of light, number requested, and other factors.


neighbor to collect them for you, it's best to have your mail and paper stopped if you're going to be out of town for a while.

# Military City USA Expo / June 29-30, 2024

Military City USA Expo is an event being organized by the Office of Councilman John Courage where active-duty and reserve military personnel, spouses, and veterans can find resources for themselves and their families. The event seeks to provide information on at least the following:

City Services (SAPD, SAFD, CPS, SAWS, ACS, and more), Education (Hazelwood Act, G.I. Bill, Colleges and Universities in San Antonio), Health (VA Claims and Services, Medicaid, disabilities, food insecurity), Financial (careers, investments, insurance, retirement, legal checklists), and Housing (VA Home Loans, Military friendly rentals) and other beneficial services.

The first-time Military City USA Expo will be held at Walker Ranch Senior Center, 835 W. Rhapsody, San Antonio, Tx on June 29 and 30, 2024. We intend to host 40 to 50 resource tables and have a schedule of presentations and/or workshops.



For additional brush/bulky over 5yds, please contact Republic Services directly to make service and payment arrangements before the Monday of the scheduled service week. Please be sure to have your Brush/Bulky items out <u>before 7:00a.m. on Monday</u>. Items placed on the curb after this time will not be picked up if your street has already been serviced. If you have any questions please contact Customer Service at 210-304-2700.

## **Brush/Bulky Guidelines:**

- Limit your brush pile to five(5) cubic yards.
  - o To determine the cubic yards take the Length x Width x Height of the pile and divide by 27. (this will equal the cubic yards for example 5ft long by 5ft Wide by 5ft High = 125 divided by 27 equals 4.63 cyds
- Brush must be placed within eight (8) feet of the curb.
- Do not place brush piles in front of parked cars, near fences, trees, mailboxes, beneath overhead wires, low-hanging tree limbs, or on top of gas/water meters.
- Brush must be set out <u>no later than 7:00 a.m. on the first day of your scheduled collection week.</u>
- Do not place material at the curb after crews have passed by your house.

Accepted Materials: Shrubs, Tree Branches, Woody Vines, Other herbaceous and woody plants, BBQ grills(without compressed gas tanks), Carpeting, Fencing, Furniture, Mattresses, Toilets, Water heaters, Appliances\*\*\*

\*\*\*Refrigerators, freezers, and a/c window units will be collected only if refrigerant has been removed and the appliance is tagged and certified, indicating removal of refrigerant\*\*\*.

## **Materials Not Accepted**

Household Trash, Construction Debris, Hazardous Materials (paints, household cleaners), Compressed Gas Tanks, Tires, Televisions, Computers, Medical Waste, Appliances with refrigerant that has not been removed

# Refrigerator & Freezer Safety throughout a Power Outage

Refrigerated or frozen foods may not be safe to eat after the loss of power. Follow the preparation and safety steps below to keep your food safe.

**BEFORE** 

Prepare for emergencies or natural disasters.



Freeze containers of water and gel packs to help keep your food at 40° F or below.



Have a cooler handy.



**Buy dry ice or block ice** to keep food cold in the refrigerator if the power might be out for a long time.

## **DURING**

## **KEEP**

Refrigerator & Freezer Doors

**CLOSED** 

After 4 hours without power, put refrigerated perishable foods in a cooler. Add ice or another cold source to keep them at 40° F or below.



## **AFTER**

Never taste food to determine if it is safe to eat. When in doubt, throw it out.

- Throw out perishable food in your refrigerator (meat, fish, cut fruits and vegetables, eggs, milk, and leftovers) after 4 hours without power or a cold source.
- Throw out any food with an unusual odor, color, or texture.
- Check temperatures of food kept in coolers or your refrigerator with a cold source. Throw out food above 40° F.
- If you have an appliance thermometer in your freezer, check to see if it is still at 40° F or below.
- You can safely refreeze or cook thawed frozen food that still contains ice crystals or is at 40° F or below.
